Notes

The long nineteenth century prepared the way for America's century: the twentieth. This module considers the country's phenomenal growth from its independence to its

entry to the Great War, when it assumed its role as somewhat reluctant world power. Through a consideration of international, demographic, economic, political, social and cultural aspects, the module contemplates the reasons behind the USA's dynamic growth, accounts fo the tensions which permeated this century and examines a variety of experiences.

In the first term you will be looking at political issues, including the American Civil War, foreign policy and the campaign for the female franchise. During the second term, thematic issues, such as the experiences of African Americans, will be explored. This scheme will enable us to grasp topics, such as race and gender, and appreciate how they have changed over time and were related to political struggles. An appraisal of the broad canvas of nineteenth-century American history will not only enlarge knowledge of that particular area and nation, but will introduce questions about the nature of historical enquiry that paves the way for further study at levels 5 and 6. It will also complement other modules you are working on during level 4. It will provide an overview of different approaches to the history of one nation, important themes and how historians work.
