Outline Syllabus

The module is divided into two main blocks, both of which cohere around intertextual relationships with a key text and recurring themes. Indicative groupings of texts include:

1."Innocence and Experience": John Milton's Paradise Lost; William Blake's Songs of Innocence and Experience; Christina Rossetti's "Goblin Market"; Philip Pullman's Northern Lights; children's stories and poetry from the seventeenth to the twentieth century.

2."Writing Back": Charles Dickens's Great Expectations; Charles Dickens's "George Silverman's Explanation"; Peter Carey's Jack Maggs; Lloyd Jones's Mr Pip; extracts from postcolonial poetry, essays, and fiction.

A primary concern of the module is intertextuality, and students are encouraged to make connections between quite different texts, to trace themes and concerns across time and space, and to discover and express intertextual relationships through scholarly analysis. The module introduces some important fields within literary studies, such as postcolonial writing, children's fiction,

and feminist literature, and particular areas of enquiry such as ethics and identity. This provides an initial engagement with a number of literary themes and ideas that students will have the opportunity to develop in greater depth at levels 5 and 6..
