Aims

Outline Syllabus

Introducing students to the legal and ethical restraints and regulation systems that affect them as journalists, along with the issues related to risk assessment. Students will also understand what it means to study in higher education and will be equipped with the tools to help them do well during the course of their academic career. This will include writing and research techniques, correct referencing and the avoidance of plagiarism.

Learning Activities
