Outline Syllabus

Historical development of travel and tourism. Tourism and Systems Theory. Analysis of external factors such as technology, the media and terrorism etc. Theories and models of economic and structural development (e.g. modernisation theory, underdevelopment theory) Social, environmental, employment, economic and cultural impacts of tourism and the management of such impacts. Host-guest relationships. Ethics and responsibility. Sustainability.

Learning Activities

The module will be delivered by means of lectures followed by workshops and/or seminars. Here students will participate in small group discussions based around material presented in the lectures using prescribed reading and case studies.

Notes

This module introduces students to how 'systems' of travel and tourism work. In doing so students will begin to recognise the role of tourism within wider social, economic, cultural and political contexts. Differing models of development will be highlighted and examined so as to contextualise both theory and practice. The module will assess both the positive and negative impacts of tourism and provide students with an understanding of some of the wider implications of tourism and tourism practices. Evidence from this module may contribute to WoW certification.
