## **Module Content**

Outline Syllabus	The taught phase of this module is characterised by a focus on Epic Realism and the work of Brecht and Piscator. Balancing theory with practice, students will learn to apply concepts such as Fabel, Gestus, VEffect and Historicization to the creation and performance of theatre with a social or political purpose. The module will culminate in assessed group performances of extant texts from the Western Canon adapted to the Epic Realist style. Following the performance each group will take part in a staff facilitated Self and Peer Assessment and Accreditation process. Finally each student will undertake a critique of their adaptation relating the efficacy of their work to key theory on Epic Realism.
