#### Aims

The module aims to introduce students to an experience of drumming in large ensembles. Students will gain knowledge and practical playing experience in three distinct drumming traditions; Brazilian, Cuban and West African. As well as practical music-making students will be encouraged to explore the original context from which these traditions emulated.

### **Outline Syllabus**

During the module students will experience music-making from predominantly three traditions:

Brazilian

Cuban

West African

Styles of music-making that emphasis the drum will be considered depending on abilities of the group.

For example

Brazil - Batucada, Samba Reggae, Marakatu

Cuba - Compassa, Mozambique, Rumba

West Africa - Kpanlogo, Gahu

Students may be arranged in smaller ensembles to explore nuances of these traditions. In keeping with a commitment to understand how, why and where these traditions have come from, group research tasks will be set to explore the contextual nature of the music.

## **Learning Activities**

Over a ten-week period students will work as a whole group to explore and experience the nature of a large drumming orchestra. This module is a practical hands-on module that gives experienced percussionist/drummers and novices the opportunity to work together. The tutor will direct and shape the group according to

needs and ability. Repertoire will be selected accordingly.
