Outline Syllabus

Historical perspectives - the changing factors that have influenced joined up provision across and within health, social care and education.

The role of the government and other national bodies in producing guidance and legislation and how this impacts upon practitioners at local level.

Consideration of what works well and an exploration of the challenges of joined up working. The advantages and disadvantages explored at a practical level using case studies and guest speakers.

Learning Activities

Lectures regarding the rationale of multi-agency working. Guest speaker slots which allow students to hear from practitioners who work in different organisations. Group discussions about how working with other professionals/organisations can be effective/detrimental for service users. Group tasks explore a number of scenarios relating to holistic working, for example joined up assessment processes, record keeping and information sharing.

Notes

The learning outcomes are designed to enable the student to consider why there is a need for joined up provision and holistic working and how this need has changed over time. This module provides the student with the opportunity to examine the concept of working in partnership with a range of client groups and to consider links to their own work experience and placements. The module has close links with 'Specific Needs' and 'Safeguarding Vulnerable groups' (level 5 modules) and helps to provide some basis for issues raised at that level.

Students will develop their communication skills in terms of working with different service users and other professionals. Guest speakers will be invited in to give current information on working practices to students. Students will also sit a mock exam to help them prepare for the timed essay.

Module material will be applied to the student's placement and work-based activity.
