Outline Syllabus

Industrialisation & social class. Examine sociological debates on stratification and social class from industrialisation onwards. Classical debates - examine Marx & Weber's accounts of the emergence of capitalism; their contrasting views on social stratification & social class. Explore social class in Britain: concepts, definitions, evolution & significance of social class as a major form of social stratification; changing structure, composition, significance and patterns of social class during past 100 years particularly in respect of: working classes – class decomposition, embourgeoisement and the 'New Working Class' debates etc; middle classes – growth of intermediate & service classes, deskilling & new professions etc. Examine social mobility, meritocracy and 'End of Class' & 'classlessness' debates. Account for the emergence of the 'Underclass' and consider related issues such as the 'Culture of Dependency' thesis etc. Examine social class and politics: voting & political allegiance & dealignment debates.

Wealth, poverty & social exclusion. Examine changing distribution of wealth & income in Britain over the past 100 years, particularly last 30 years; definitions, explanations and measurement of poverty & social exclusion. Examine changes & trends in the extent of poverty in Britain over the past 100 years (particularly last 30 years). Examine poverty & social exclusion in relation to: gender, ethnicity and age. Examine efficacy of social policies & other measures designed to tackle poverty & social exclusion.

Work & unemployment in the British economy. Examine changes in the British economy of over the past 100 years (particularly the past 30 years) including: economic structural decline/de-industrialisation, impact of technology, expansion & significance of the tertiary/service economy etc. and relate these changes to shifting patterns of work organisation and employment. Discuss patterns of discrimination & changes in gendered horizontal & vertical occupational segregation within the British occupational structure over past 50 years. Examine racial & ethnic minorities within the British labour market during the past 50 years: developments & advances;

account for persisting patterns of racial/ethnic discrimination & segregation etc. Examine historical & contemporary patterns of industrial conflict & labour relations. Consider impact of Globalisation on British labour market.

Examine causes and changing patterns of unemployment over past 100 years, particularly last 30 years; consider the social distribution of unemployment by class, gender, race/ethnicity and age. Examine government & economic strategies & policies to tackle unemployment, particularly those designed to address youth unemployment and the long-term unemployed.

Education & the modern economy: Examine sociological explanations for differential educational achievements in relation to social class; gender, racial & ethnic differences Explore how both in-school and external factors interact with these forms of social difference to influence or construct eventual educational outcomes. Consider some recent initiatives & policies to widen educational opportunities for all, particularly for low income and ethnic groups.
