Outline Syllabus

Contemporary photographic practice encompasses a wide range of creative and technical approaches dealing with a host of personal, cultural and political topics. It is important that students are not only familiar with such a wide range of contemporary photographic practice, but also that they have an understanding of the cultural influences which inform it. This module presents and discusses a broad selection of work from influential practitioners whilst placing such practice in its wider critical context. The influence of theorists, social, political and cultural change and recent developments in communications will also be discussed, charting the photographic medium's development over the last quarter century of the twentieth century and the first decade of the twenty first century.

Learning Activities

Teaching will take the form of a series of seminars in which students are encouraged to participate. The syllabus will be supported by exhibition trips, and visits to the College by relevant practitioners.

The associated essay requirement will be introduced in a briefing session and supported by tutorials during production before submission for assessment towards the end of the module.
