Aims

This course introduces students to vocal technique and repertoire through group singing work. We'll be looking at how to keep the voice healthy and to develop an approach, which looks at the voice as a whole instrument combining body and imagination. The course will give an introduction to harmony and small ensemble singing, as well as basic musical skills (aural and score-reading as well as vocal). The course aims to encourage the use of singing as a significant means of expression in both individual and social terms. The class requires everyone to sustain a simple solo line at some point during the course, and towards the end of the semester a showing of group singing will form part of the culmination of the work.
