## Outline Syllabus

*Technical Operations: Control Gallery layout & structure; roles and responsibilities; studio discipline; studio language, basic studio camera operation (focus, zoom, pedestal), basic vision and sound desk operation (signal path block diagrams), basic Auto-Prompt and Aston operation (saving, layout, format conversion), crew communications, cable coiling & storage. Running Orders and backtiming. NLE Editing: basic NLE suite operation and components (for simple trimming & VT playback).*

*Television Reportage & Current Affairs Programming: components and structure of broadcast newsroom (or any broadcast operation with a shifting agenda) operation, nature of news (or current affairs) editor, the shifting nature of the news agenda, operation of one-plus-one and one-plus-two in studio; operation to Network timings.*

*Broadcast Operation: The Content Editor's Job, The P.A.'s job, timings, elastic endings, operating to a flexible Running Order, basic set design, shifting priorities ('breaking' items), the needs of the studio anchor, negotiation and selection of suitable contributors, 'PasT' completion and legal signoffs. Linking script to camera cards.*

*Other: Health & Safety in studio.*

## Learning Activities

Lectures and practical workshops leading to practical sessions with production equipment in studio; formal group workshop sessions on back-timing, operating a flexible Running Order. Visiting Industry Specialist (News Producer or other 'live' producer, where possible). The initial sessions will be lecture and workshop-based out of studio context; with subsequent sessions spent building practical and teamwork skills with production equipment in studio. A simple programme format is negotiated with the students and programme running orders are researched and

produced. Module content is Tutor-led but team-focused
