Outline Syllabus

There are two separate classes for this module. The first will take the form of regular practical classes in ensemble singing/choir covering two terms where students will develop skills in score reading, basic music theory, aural skills, sight-singing and sung ensemble including block harmonies and counterpoint. The second set of classes will cover vocal anatomy of singing exploring a range of vocal qualities and techniques for healthy sung vocal production. Students will also explore the expressive properties of music and its theatrical usage before moving on to the specifics of an action-based approach to acting through song. This will include repertoire research and selection and lead on to the preparation and performance of a solo song suitable for audition purposes. In addition, students will also explore ensemble singing material. Where feasible the work of the module is allied to that of the work in Voice 1 and Movement for Actors 1 both in terms of vocabularies employed and, where possible, occasional team teaching. You are expected to demonstrate an awareness and commitment to professional codes of practice
