### **Outline Syllabus**

The module is structured around the development and presentation of a performance for young people. The text used will either be play written specifically for a young audience or an adaptation of an existing text for this purpose. The module draws together the skills, knowledge and experience developed elsewhere in the programme and provides students with the opportunity to put theory into practice. The focus of the module is on exploring the processes leading to performance (planning, rehearsal etc.) and not simply the production itself. The module has four phases:

- planning and research
- rehearsal techniques
- production
- critical appraisal

The module is heavily tutor directed, with students being encouraged to explore each phase of the production process. Throughout the module, students will be required to keep a production casebook/logbook in which they reflect on the process and their understanding of the development of the production. This is then translated into a short critical appraisal given in a Viva Voce.

### **Learning Activities**

The module is based around the development of one major piece of performed work. The students will undertake major roles within the production process, under close staff supervision. Normally the production will be staff directed. The module will primarily be taught through workshops, however, specific elements will be delivered

through lectures, seminars and one to one tutorials.

### **Notes**

The module will result in a venue based public performance aimed at school/college audiences. The production will be supported by an education pack and workshops created and delivered by Level 5 students as part of the Drama and Theatre in Education module.
