Learning Activities

A variety of methods will be utilised including lectures, tutorial support, workshops, ICT and practical sessions, SPSS, online activities, guest speakers, careers events, problem solving within a workshop setting, field trip activities.

Notes

Students will develop a range of essential research skills to undertake and reflect upon problem solving research within a supportive environment. The module builds on prior modules at level 4 and enhances students' abilities to engage in research activities. The module includes a short field to apply methods in 'the field'. For students who are intending to write a dissertation at Level 6, this module provides an essential grounding. Students will develop an understanding of a range of work related and career planning skills and the module provides students with the opportunity to develop their organisational awareness and, for those who have previously completed the World of Work Bronze, to complete the World of Work Silver.
