#### **Outline Syllabus**

Written Language: Analysis of a variety of extended texts. Advanced study of grammar and lexis. Two-way translation of texts adapted from authentic sources (press, magazines, web etc), involving consultation with native speakers where possible and the study of model versions of the translated text. The students must also produce a translation log or work file to include the original texts, their own translations and the model translations together with their observations on the work they have done. A series of lectures on stylistics introduces the terminology of linguistics and prepares students for advanced language exercises such as critique, translation and business communication skills.

Oral/Aural: Workshop-based study and practice with TL native-speaker students where possible, incorporating contrastive study of spoken English and spoken TL. Advanced study and practice in intonation, pronunciation and different registers. Various oral exercises: conversation, dialogues, role-plays, interpreting. Self-assessment is used with the aid of video-recorded performance of specific tasks. The availability of web-based resources for practice and consolidation of language skills is given further emphasis to support independent learning by students during their year abroad.

#### **Learning Activities**

Group work, translation, grammar, a variety of practical writing tasks, role-plays, interpreting, presentations.
