Notes

This module is concerned with analysing some of the key criminological issues around contemporary prisons. The module is therefore concerned with how the institution contributes to the struggle to maintain social order and in the reproduction of social divisions particulary around social class, gender and 'race'. The issue of order will also be explored in more micro terms. Therefore the module is concerned with exploring issues around prison disturbances and the legitimacy of the institution. The module concludes by critically considering the issues of reform and abolitionism.
