Students will participate as performers, visual creators, writers, administrators and technicians in the production of a new work. The process will begin with seminars and workshops addressing generic issues of adaptation and workshops exploring the process of adaptation using selected extracts. Although the whole process will be directed by a member of staff, input from other members of the staff team and

students who are directing and working on their own adaptations will view work in progress. The final performance in a public venue will be a new work for the theatre (for example, an adaptation of a novel, short story or screenplay).
