Learning Activities

Each session will include a short lecture introducing the required knowledge and core materials, supported by the use of the virtual learning environment. Learning will be supported and facilitated through group work, with a focus on linking theory to social work practice, for example through the use of case studies to develop a thoughtful approach to poverty aware practice. The use of case studies, and both practice based and academic presentations, will enhance the student learning experience. Self-directed learning will be integral to the module and will be based on session learning, complemented by directed reading/activity between sessions in order build on and develop the theoretical base provided in lectures.
