The ageing process, the concept of ageism.

Common pathologies and conditions for example: COPD, emphysema, , heart failure, diabetes, motor neurone disease, MS, CVA, , falls, common fractures, joint replacements, osteo and rheumatoid arthritis.

Effects of multi-pathology, medications and contraindications.

Complications of conditions to include: communication (speech & hearing) problems, cognitive problems, perception, dysphagia (including awareness of screening procedures), sensory loss, proprioception, learning disability in adults.
