Aims

To engage critically with the notion of 'applied criminology' by exploring how the understandings generated by criminological research are, or can be, applied, in a particular area of the field, and to demonstrate understanding of the importance of theory and research in developing reflective and effective professional practice.

To enable students to identify and develop their personal attributes, skills, and experiences in relation to their career aims in the field of community and criminal justice within context of current labour market opportunities and requirements. To support continuing engagement with personal development planning with a particular focus on developing students self awareness, organisational awareness and world of work skills.

Learning Outcomes

After completing the module the student should be able to:

- 1 Critically evaluate how criminological theory and research can be employed to develop policy and inform policy / practice in a particular Community or Criminal Justice setting.
- 2 To evidence self awareness in critically reflecting on, analysing and reviewing, a range of employment options in the field, to identify the selection methods used by employers and be able to evidence reflection on strategies to respond to these.
- 3 To evidence knowledge of the WOW Skills process and support offered within LJMU and be able to demonstrate how the chosen programme of study and other activities can help create evidence of WOW skills.

Learning Activities

The module is delivered through a combination of lectures, online materials

supported by seminars.

The module will utilise blended learning, which will combine traditional teaching strategies with elements of E-learning.

Students are encouraged to monitor their own learning and identify areas which need developing through their Personal Development Plans.

Lectures and online learning materials will be used to provide an overview of each topic. The lectures will be delivered by the module team and, on occasion, guest speakers from different relevant professional backgrounds, with particular expertise in aspects of the curriculum. Workshops will be used as a space for students to explore and discuss issues in small groups.

Electronic seminar and project work in small groups, in the seminars, will be used to further explore the issues raised in lectures and through the students own reading.

Students will be expected to engage in self directed learning to develop their knowledge of the field and to prepare for lectures and seminars.

Notes

This is a core course for Criminology and Criminology and Psychology students. The course will be delivered through lectures, workshops and online learning. The module will also be supplemented by traditionally taught sessions. PDP is embedded in the module and students are expected to utilise PDP and the Graduate Skills Passport throughout the module. As part of the module students can work towards their Silver world of work statements. Work towards these statements along with evidence of addressing areas identified as requiring action, in line with their PDP, is an integral part of the module.
