Notes

The purpose of this module is for students to examine the interplay between two of the most important driving forces in humankind's recent history: the pursuit of war and the desire for peace. The module will be presented within an international history framework, and will focus on the strategic and humanitarian history of the period from the mid-19th century to the first years of the 21st century. It will be comprised of four sections, spread out over the course of two semesters, each of which will contain mixed elements of history and historiography, as well as international relations theory and strategic studies.
