Aims

- 2 Produce a piece of original writing, which demonstrates an ability to synthesize observed techniques.
- 3 Demonstrate an increased capacity for articulating appraisal and evaluation of prose fiction.
- 4 Redraft their own original stories in the light of peer criticism, applying the outcomes of the workshops to the redrafting process.

Outline Syllabus

Through lectures/workshops a deepening understanding of the fiction-writing techniques; the production of a piece of original prose within a chosen genre; the further development of the ability to constructively criticise the work of peers.

The fiction produced for Component One will be accompanied by a 1,000 word commentary, which will not be directly assessed but will place the work in a context that accounts for its development through the workshop process.

The essay for Component Two will be an appraisal of a peer's work produced for a workshop with a log summarising their responses to each piece submitted to the

workshop throughout the semester.
