Outline Syllabus

This core module offers the opportunity for practical and creative examinations of the stagecraft and design possibilities in theatre. For example

- a) A practical exploration into, and written evaluation of, the workings of lighting, sound, construction, and stage management. This might include Health & Safety in the workplace; COSHH; the design and operation of lighting and sound for performance; the creation of a stage manager's prompt copy; sourcing or making theatrical properties; construction work, and set design and decoration.
- b) An exploration, through written work, into the aesthetic or creative possibilities inherent in the application of technical theatre skills
- c) The accumulation of a toolbox of practical, operational and technically orientated theatre production skills.

This course is a detailed introduction to the world of the theatre technician. The student is taught to use industry standard lighting and sound equipment, the basics of stage management, and introduced to both set design and construction skills. The student then applies these skills to the realisation of a short performance project involving other members of the student body.
