Outline Syllabus

The exploration of the origins of the Welfare State and evolution of provision in line with political ideology and economic forces. Areas of interest will cover proof relief, inequality, homelessness, lone parenthood, concepts of 'deserving' and 'undeserving' and will cover a variety of provisions which can include Social security, the NHS, Housing, Education etc. Examining the experience of traditionally excluded groups in relation to access and experiences of such provisions, e.g., topics may include ethnic minorities, women, immigrants, homeless, asylum seekers.
