Outline Syllabus

Students will study a range of material by and related to a given author. Depending on the author selected, it may be a matter of looking at writing across a range of forms (eg poetry, novels, essays, memoir); it may also include correspondence, biography and paratextual materials to give students a sense of the publishing conditions behind key works.

The module is designed so that individual members of staff can teach it according to their own specialisms: hence the format and syllabus are left open for adaptation to the teaching of particular selected authors.
