Outline Syllabus

To complete this module, the student is required to spend time abroad during the summer vacation between Levels 5 and 6. Prior to the visit, the student must attend preparatory sessions with the module tutor and (as appropriate) other staff involved in facilitating the proposed trip, in order to ensure s/he has met the legal requirements for the proposed travel experience (for example, with regard to visa application), and received any necessary cultural orientation and health and safety guidance for all proposed activities. Students will also receive intellectual and methodological preparation for undertaking the observation of another culture, and (where relevant) the analysis of work or study; and for reflecting on the development of their skills, including those of intercultural learning. The assessment comprises a portfolio of preparation, a reflective report (likely to take the form of blog) on their international experience.
