Outline Syllabus

This module will aim to explore how alcohol and substance misuse impacts on communities and wider society. Candidates will explore community engagement and involvement practices that are implemented as part of service provision with particular focus on the using service users as s resource for service delivery.

Consideration will be given to the current practice values listed in Community Development Work National Occupational Standards (LLUK March, 2010) and how these can be effectively applied in the alcohol and substance misuse field. These include: Social, Environmental and Economic Justice; Collective Action for Equality; Community Empowerment; and Learning through Practice

The module aims to raise students' awareness and understanding of both theory and practice of community work enabling effective practice through the investigation and evaluation of a range of approaches and interventions.

Learning Activities

Classroom based learning will take the form of lecturers, video, group activities and discussion; small group presentations.

Notes

The wider impact of alcohol and substance misuse patterns, historically and

currently, will be explored in this module. A range of models for service provision will be critically evaluated. Regular tutorials will provide opportunities for informal formative assessment to support student learning and discuss their overall progress.
