Additional Information	This module will introduce students to a series of key thinkers in order to trace out the emergence of key strands in contemporary cultural and critical theory in relation to particular challenges associated with modernity and the conceptual, ethical, and political questions these presented. A particular emphasis will be placed upon the constitution and experiences of modern subjects in relation to what might be termed the violence and trauma of modernity. The thinkers covered might well be subject to change, but might indicatively include writers such as Adorno, Horkheimer, Benjamin, Gramsci, Foucault, Lacan, Butler, and Agamben, among others.
