### **Aims**

To develop fluency in improvisation across a range of popular music styles including blues, jazz, Latin and rock.

### **Learning Outcomes**

After completing the module the student should be able to:

- 1 Apply the use of major and minor scales, their modes and their harmonies for the creation of riffs and phrases for mprovisation within a popular/jazz context.
- 2 Use the blues scale and 12 bar blues form with their associated dominant 7th arpeggios/ chords, in the most common blues keys and be to play a variety of popular/jazz phrases and patterns fluently.
- 3 Consolidate the use of the major scale modes and their related chords, in music that contains shifts of key centre, and chords of no less than 2 bars, with fluency.
- 4 Play, with reasonable fluency, melodic and harmonic lines over rapid changes of chords.
- 5 Improvise with reasonable fluency over Rhythm Changes tunes – such as: Anthropology, Oleo, Lester Leaps In.

### **Notes**

This largely practical module will build on material covered in Music Theory and Listening Skills and Personal Instrumental/Vocal Development 1. Students will get to put their theoretical and practical knowledge of scales and chords to creative use and develop their improvising skills within various styles of popular music including blues, jazz, Latin and rock. It is hoped that they will continue using and developing these skills throughout their performing careers.

This Module would be enhanced by a series of seminars conducted by visiting specialist professional instrumentalists throughout the academic year (depending on availability and faculty budget).
