Notes

This module provides the opportunity for students to demonstrate their professional competence in organising (including choosing repertoire and musicians), rehearsing and performing a substantial set featuring themselves. They will be able to have an informal 'dry run' at some point during the year. Leading up to the final performance they will need to plan their sets carefully and liaise with technicians to produce professional quality, high level performances. This module will require a good deal of preparation, practice and rehearsal with the supporting groups throughout the year.

This is very much a student-led module – timetable allocation will be given for students to use rehearsal facilities, but it they will be expected to spend time organising the sessions and their band members as they would in a professional situation. Students will additionally be expected to spend a considerable amount of their own time doing individual practice. Part of the assessment of the final performance will be on the professionalism of their performance including liaising with venue technicians and all other preparation beforehand.
