Aims	 Introduce students to the key roles of various non-state actors such as International Organisations, Non-Governmental Organisations and Transnational Corporations. Develop an understanding of how such actors are structured and how this impacts policy making and engagement within the international system. Introduce students to theoretical perspectives such as new institutionalism and neo-liberal institutionalism, alongside theories such as realism, liberalism and Marxism, to understand how these organisations have developed and how they behave.
