Outline Syllabus

Starting from reflections on students' own memories of childhood reading, the module will survey developments in children's literature from folk and fairytales through the 'classic' age of 19th and 20th century children's books, before studying modern and contemporary writers such as Tolkein, Blyton, Roald Dahl and J K Rowling. It will examine the ideological and social messages transmitted by this material, as well as considering the ways in which children experience these texts and how that experience impinges on their personal development. Modern media such as film and video will also be considered. The material will be related to some relevant literary, educational and psychological theory, and the module will consider some of the roles which literature may have in the linguistic, imaginative, and social development of children, and within the educational process.

Learning Activities

Lectures, seminars, tutorials, private study; and where possible and appropriate, fieldwork.
