Aims

Develop an understanding of how the study of gender has been variously constructed and developed within criminology, particularly since the 1970s. Explore the relationship of gender to offending and victimization. Explore the nature and significance of gender differentials in crime control, criminal justice and penal policies.

Learning Outcomes

- 6 Synthesise insights from a range of disciplines pertaining to the relationships between gender and crime, harm, power and 'the state'.

Masculinities and crime.
