#### Aims

#### **Learning Activities**

Lectures aim to review and discuss critical literature on policing, security and risk-related issues to gain theoretical, policy, empirical and practical understanding. Guest speakers will provide practical understanding, as well as networking and career building options. Moreover, qualitative methodologies and reflective use of methods will be examined.

The module is going to educate in the use of the interview method, for which mostly workshops will be used to exercise its usefulness and application. These exercises will prepare students for an essential part of the module, which is to eventually go to interview policing and security practitioners, analyse the results, and write and present a paper on their findings. This involves approaching possible respondents, getting their informed consent (for a recorded interview), doing a 1 hour (or longer) interview, transcribing the recorded material and analysing the content. The analysis has to lead to a paper they will present in writing and verbally at the end of the module, which will be the main assessment. Academic presentation and writing skills

will therefore be additionally trained and assessed.

#### **Notes**

This module takes cognisance of the National Occupational Standards – AA1, AB, AE1 & CB1.

The module aims to develop students understanding of the work of statutory and non-statutory bodies in society and relate this experience to policing and security in society. The module will build on L4's Introduction to Critical Criminology and Policing in a Diverse Society, and L5's Youth Justice, Professional Skills for Policing and Investigative Skills.
