Outline Syllabus

Consideration of texts and discussion of the role of the poet in contemporary society, presentations covering various aspects of the contemporary poetry scene, workshops focusing on the drafting, editing and context of poems.

Learning Activities

Reading poems, students' own and those of published contemporary poets, attending readings, giving readings, drafting and editing poems, presenting poems to your peers.

Notes

In this module the student will begin to function as a professional poet, further developing their awareness of the resources available and the demands involved, particularly with regard to audience. The student will be introduced to the variety of ways in which contemporary poets interact with the wider culture such as collaborative work, cross-artform working, poetry in performance, poetry in the community and commissioned poetry. The student will be encouraged to explore the idea of the role of the poet in this context and consider temporary questions for the artform regards audience development and the value of poetry.
