Outline Syllabus

The course is divided into two parts.

Part One: Exploration of the role of the director – Practical exploration and analysis of the management of:

- 1. Time, space and action
- 2. Image, sound and text
- 3. Text selection and analysis including the challenges and imperatives of genre
- 4. Plans towards rehearsal process and production
- 5. Rehearsal discourses with actors and technicians

Part Two: Directorial Rehearsal and Presentation

Students direct a small group of their peers in a practical exploration of these issues and their chosen text

The course opens with a series of lectures and practical workshops introducing a variety of approaches to directing, before students embark on rehearsals of their

chosen text extract with a group of student actors and technicians, leading to performance towards the conclusion of the course.
