Aims

- 2. To further instill the discipline that informs a writer's life, in particular the

management of time and the provision of both essential solitude and essential stimulation from well-chosen reading and engagement with other art forms.

- 3. To further the student's ability to participate in workshops and learn how to give to them and take from them in a critical, constructive and receptive way.
- 4. To bring about motivation and direction in terms of the student's future as a poet, including an understanding of audiences for their work.
- 5. To further develop the poet's voice and awareness of their poetic technique in relation to the work of modern and contemporary poetry.

- 1 Redraft and edit their own poems in the light of workshop feedback.
- Write an original portfolio of poems and commentary reflecting on their own poetry and the ways in which it is influenced by reading and workshops.

- Use a range of creative stimulus, further reading and research as part of an independent creative process.
