Outline Syllabus

By looking at a number of films and the different ways in which these have been interpreted by critics, the course will highlight some of the major theoretical concerns of film studies through both close readings of these interpretations and through a consideration of the films themselves. Some of the interpretative approaches to be studied will include psychoanalysis, feminism, Marxism, postcolonial criticism, deconstruction and reception studies.
