Outline Syllabus

- 1. The pharmacological and phenomenological effects of drugs.
- 2. Drug concepts terminologies and typologies; risks, hazards and harms/benefits.
- 3. Theories and models of drug use [eg. medical, criminological, psycho-social]
- 4. The aetiology [causes] and epidemiology [prevalence, demography] of drug use.
- 5. Drug consumption drug careers, set and setting, culture and sub-culture.

6. The consequences of drug use - disease, psychoses, crime, deaths, soicial problems.

7. Drug policy, drug strategy and drug services - in the UK and internationally.

Learning Activities

The two hour slots will be based on a series of lectures, each ending with a discussion session. Lectures will also include videotapes, demonstrations and weekly supplementary readings/handouts.

There will be a workshop in semester one to discuss the coursework requirements, and a further workshop in semester two to discuss the exam.

Notes

This module examines the psychological and social dimensions of drug use

including: concepts, aetiology, epidemiology, cosequences and responses. The main theories and models of drug use are critically examined, along with consumption patterns and related policy development. The course also examines drug use in its wider context, including its historical, cultural, economic and political contexts.
