Notes

This module looks at instances of escalated violence in conflict, with focus on specific conflicts as case studies, such as the Rwandan Genocide, the 'Troubles' in Northern Ireland, the Bosnian War, the Sri Lankan killing fields, as well as on-going localised conflict in Central African regions. Weekly topics will consider the victimisation and targeting of specific social groups, criminological theories in relation to how and why this occurs and, what responses are in place to work with survivors of conflict related violence and oppression.
