Outline Syllabus

UK and international trauma systems, major incident systems and trauma cost to society. Individual roles in incident management, personal safety, trauma teams. Mechanisms and patterns on injury, specific trauma management and research based care. ATLS principles update (roadside to definitive care), inter-professional roles in trauma care.

Learning Activities

Formal lectures, group / individual tutorials, discussions, seminars.

Notes

The module is structured and designed for those practitioners involved or interested in either the hospital or pre-hospital sphere of major trauma. It has been planned to enable students to develop their knowledge and understanding relating to a range of major trauma issues and practices.

1. The module learning outcomes and relevant subject benchmark statements are in line with the QAA framework for higher education qualifications in England, Wales and Northern Ireland. The module is aligned to the Level 6 descriptors for a Level 6 Higher Education Qualification.

2. The module involves classroom attendance, which is further supported by a range of learning support tools. Part time over 14 weeks.

3. The criteria for admission to the module require that candidates are currently working within an NHS Trust. Ideally candidates will have a minimum of a diploma (level 5). Students are also accepted onto the programme as part of the international top up degrees for nurses and paramedics.

4. The final award is a Continuing Professional Development – Developments Trauma Care, 20 credits at Level 6.

5. The students have access to a Blackboard site and the University's other range of electronic support such as access to the electronic library facilities. The module has continued to develop with an up to date Blackboard site reflecting contemporary reading lists and links to journal articles. The module Blackboard site has also developed and now includes a number of presentations for students to access on areas such as critical writing and library support. The students also have access to the module leader through phone contact, emails and face to face meetings if this is viable. A module guide is also provided, which guides students to the wider range of support available to students.

7. Attendance is required throughout the module; although some learning material will be available through the Blackboard site.

10. This is a standalone CPD. A specific external examiner is identified for the module who also covers the BSc students who complete this module. The module is also included in the programme specification for the BSc (Hons) Health and Social Care Development, BSc (Hons) Paramedic Science (International) and the BSc (Hons) Nursing (International), these are referred to as the top up degree for Health Care Professionals who already have a diploma award, 120 level 5 credits.
