3. To enable students to use their own research to engage in critical and historical debates about the class dimensions of culture and society since c. 1800

4. To evaluate critical approaches to the formation and characteristics of a distinctively working-class tradition of autobiographical writing

5. To analyse the relationship between life-writing, subjectivity and history

You will be expected to share your research during seminar workshops and to work collaboratively with other students on tasks like proof-reading and copy-editing and using social media to promote our collective research.
