Outline Syllabus

Definitions of health and illness. A brief history of health care and in particular the NHS. Government (including EU etc) policies on (public) health and health care. A sociological view of health and health care. Differentiating environmental, community and public health in a socio-economic context. It is designed to facilitate the study of health promotion.

Learning Activities

Formal lectures serve to map the module syllabus and indicate the level of study required. This develops the students' skills in listening and processing technical information. The students are encouraged to interact during the lectures; to question, to express opinions and to influence the content. Thus the distinction between lecture/seminar and workshop is not rigid. Distinct workshops are held to enable students to develop relevant practical skills and to work in small groups to suggest solutions to problems set. Students are strongly encouraged to discover information for themselves and take responsibility for their own learning making full use of the LRC.

Notes

The meaning of the terms 'health' and 'disease' for health professionals and others. The history of the health (care) before the NHS, the development of NHS and its evolution and future prospects. Present Government policy; promise and practice. The contrasting models of health; medical and sociological, are they compatable?
