### Notes

This module will develop the students' knowledge, skills and professionalism enabling them to more effectively manage patients with specific illnesses or conditions

It is available as one of the BSc modules but will also be available on CPDApply

It has been designed to develop the students' knowledge and ability to manage a range of illnesses and conditions using higher education as a platform. In order to achieve this goal, the syllabus offers a variety of theoretical insights and professional considerations and the content relates directly and specifically to paramedic practice. The underpinning principle is that students are to develop their assessment and management skills whilst working operationally.

The module learning outcomes and relevant subject benchmark statements are in line with the QAA framework for higher education qualifications in England, Wales

and Northern Ireland. The module is aligned to the Level 6 descriptors for a Level 6 Higher Education Qualification. The module is a part-time attendance module that is fourteen weeks long. The criteria for admission to the module is that candidates are currently employees who can utilise CPDApply. Ideally candidates will be working on emergency vehicles, however if this is not the case and a candidate can demonstrate a professional need for the module they can be offered the opportunity to negotiate enrolment on to the module.

The final award is a Continuing Professional Development Certificate - Common Illnesses and Conditions, 15 credits at Level 6.

The students have access to a Blackboard site and the University's other range of electronic support such as access to the electronic library facilities. The module will have a developed Blackboard site reflecting contemporary reading lists and links to journal articles. The module Blackboard site will also develop a number of presentations for students to access on areas such as academic writing. The students also have access to the module leader through phone contact, emails and face to face meetings if this is viable. A module guide is also provided which guides students to the wider range of support available
