Outline Syllabus

The module examines intersections between literature and visual art in the 20th and 21st centuries. It addresses the ways in which writers have engaged with art questions, whether through the literary representation of artists and artworks or through attention to the visual and material properties of writing (eg concrete poetry). Conversely, it addresses the ways artists have engaged with writing as a part of artistic practice, incorporating text into visual and other media or creating a new genre of 'art-writing'.

Key questions include:

- How do writers refer to artistic practice as a means of reflecting on the qualities and limits of literary activity?
- What does it mean to produce or read writing as art, rather than literature?
- How does art help us understand language and textuality?
