Aims

The module aims to develop students understanding of the legislative and policy framework which sets out the parameters of multi-agency working arrangements across the sector.

Provide an opportunity for students to critically explore the range of regulatory processes and professional values which inform practice, theories of team work, issues of professional status and power and working across organisational boundaries.

Provide an opportunity for students, from different disciplinary backgrounds, to work across disciplinary boundaries and gain experience, through work related learning using 'real life' case studies, of the complexities of multi-agency working.

Learning Outcomes

After completing the module the student should be able to:

- 1 State key theoretical philosophical, political, legislative, organisational, policy and practice frameworks which underpin multi agency and partnership working.
- 2 Critically evaluate the effectiveness of partnership and multi-agency working in achieving desired results and be able to identify, and critically appraise, barriers to effectiveness, and strategies to overcome them.
- 3 Identify the opportunities and challenges presented by multi agency and partnership working in one area of the sector with particular reference to the social impact for diverse and/or vulnerable communities.

Learning Activities

Online learning materials will be used to provide an overview of each topic. Electronic seminar work in small groups will be used to further explore the issues raised in on-line lectures and through the students own reading. The module will adopt a reflective approach to the subject matter providing the tools required to develop student learning and independent on-line study. It will offer several on-line teaching strategies and digital resources in order to support practical application. As well as the above there will be workshops supported by online learning materials and forums which will be used to promote small group discussions in which students and the lecturer can discuss information on a chosen issue. They provide an

opportunity to explore topics by discussion, and to identify opportunities to share experiences, solve problems as well as to learn and practice new skills. Students will be expected to engage in self-directed learning to develop their knowledge of the field.

Notes

This module provides an opportunity for students to consider cross disciplinary issues as they affect multi-agency working e.g. the philosophies that underpin social work compared with policing.
