Outline Syllabus

Prepare a proposal of the intended study including a timetable. Undertake a literature review. Present details and justification of a methodology. Collect data. Analyse data using technology where appropriate. Present results and a discussion. Submit the written dissertation.

Learning Activities

Library research. Field data collection. Project Planning and delivery. Use of IT Search facilities, WWW etc., Writing. Analysis. Tutorials, Study Skills.

Notes

Appropriate research projects will be discussed with students on a group and individual basis in the second semester of Level 5. The research should take place during the summer vacation of the second year, and will be completed during the third year. Students will be allocated a dissertation supervisor in the second semester of the second year. Depending on the nature of the topic, students will be expected to spend three to four weeks gathering data. Ethical approval and Risk assessments must be in place as appropriate and work will not be admissable if standard procedures have not been followed. Tutorials will continue during semester one and two of the third year. All projects will be marked by two staff, with any contentious issues being subject to a third marking. The external examiner will moderate a sample of studies.
