## **Outline Syllabus**

Defining crime and deviance - making sense of social constructions. Exploration of media representations of children and young people and associated, popular discourses. The response of Governments to youth crime - from punishment ot restorative justice. An evaluation of the criminal justice system and its impact on young people and offending. Exploring theories about the social construction of deviance and punishment - explanations of offending in adolescence. Prevention and early intervention - working with children and families to divert criminal pathways. Risk factors and common themes - alcohol, family contexts, drugs, mental health, exclusion, domestic violence, bullying etc. Roles and responsibilities of key agencies, e.g. Police, Youth Offending Teams, Schools, Youth Workers, mental health practitioners etc. Social control, coercion and punishment. The demonisation of childhood.
