Outline Syllabus

Students will define their own fields of study and objectives through seminar and tutorial guidance. The topic will reflect aspects of previous and ongoing work. All critical study progress will be through a series of stages as part of an ongoing programme of support and scholarly assistance. Stages include: synopsis; design of the study; information acquisition; analysis and evaluation; development of draft chapters; and submission of bibliography. The study will culminate in an 4,000 word dissertation on a topic agreed with the supervising tutor. Students will submit drafts of their critical study at agreed points within the timetable for feedback and comment. Each student will be allocated a tutor who will supervise the project, give feedback and advice monitor the progress of the study in regular sessions.

Learning Activities

Research topics are chosen by students in consultation with module staff. The dissertation supervisor will monitor progress through regular timetabled tutorial sessions.

This module extends the work undertaken in the HND Fine Art Critical Study Unit, however this second written study must clearly distinct and separate from the previous work.

Students should further analyses and interpret a body of knowledge that is informed by their own ongoing studio practice. The finished presentation should conform to the standards of lucid scholarship and should be no shorter than 4000 words. This is a yearlong module and runs alongside the two practical studio based Fine Art modules. It is expected that these concurrent modules should influence and inform each other.
