Aims

Outline Syllabus

The subject identified will enable students to investigate a topic of individual choice; it should be a subject area for which plentiful information is available. The research can have a focus in an aesthetic, technical, visual, marketing or historical point of view but must involve the integration of knowledge with aspects of your course.

The following apsects of the written piece need to be considered: Inclusion of an appropriate abstract
Well developed and valid question or hypothesis
Use of a range of contemporary and appropriate information
Professional presentation, with a high quality writing style and layout
Appropriate refrencing and bibliography.

Through group seminar activity students will apply appropriate documentation and recording of their work for presentation purposes in both career and postgraduate application. Students will be kept informed of university and national exhibitions on notice boards.

Learning Activities

The students will select an area of research which will demonstrate an understanding of academic writing. The assignment will be carried out utilising research methodologies and academic study skills introduced in previous studies. The chosen investigation may complement future project work or allow students to develop relevant but previously unexplored areas of personal interest.

Notes

For students with specific learning needs, a more suitable and appropriate form of this assessment may be negotiated.

This module provides the opportunity to submit a professionally presented dissertation (6000 word illustrated, Harvard-referenced paper, double spaced and bound). It allows each student to work independently and in depth from a chosen subject relating to Art & Design and/or a theme deriving from their own practice.
